CERTIFICATE COURSE IN GERMAN

Objectives

This course focuses on basic linguistic and communicative structures of the German language. Students will be introduced to various aspects of German culture and learn to communicate in simple everyday situations and personal interaction. The module will adopt an integrated approach to language learning and will emphasize equally all four skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking as well as the acquisition of grammar structures and vocabulary. Audio and video materials will also be used to supplement the textbook and to provide students with a better insight into German Speaking countries, their cultures and the life of their people. The module will also attempt to help students optimize their learning by teaching them vital strategies for language learning and language use. This should, in turn, allow students to develop greater learner autonomy.

Understanding: Listening, Reading

Listening

I can understand familiar words and very basic phrases concerning myself, my family and immediate concrete surroundings when people speak slowly and clearly.

Reading

I can understand familiar names, words and very simple sentences, for example on notices and posters or in catalogues.

Speaking: Spoken interaction, Spoken production

Spoken interaction

I can interact in a simple way provided the other person is prepared to repeat or rephrase things at a slower rate of speech and help me formulate what I'm trying to say. I can ask and answer simple questions in areas of immediate need or on very familiar topics.

Spoken production

I can use simple phrases and sentences to describe where I live and people I know.

Writing: Writing

Writing

I can write a short, simple postcard, for example sending holiday greetings. I can fill in forms with personal details, for example entering my name, nationality and address on a hotel registration form.

Lectures

During the lectures, the students will be introduced to topics of study as well new grammatical aspects. They will also be taught how to react in the foreign language in various common communicative situations. The emphasis will be on developing reading, writing and listening skills as well as acquiring and practicing new linguistic structures. The lessons will be mostly based on reference books listed below and partly on lecturer's own material.

Tutorials

The tutorials will capitalize on small group environment and seek to provide students with the opportunity to develop speaking skills and acquire new vocabulary. They will also support the lectures in reinforcing the students' grasp of linguistic structures learnt. The lessons will also be based on reference books listed below as well as additional material prepared by tutors and lecturers.

Attendance at lectures and tutorials is compulsory. Those who do not have 85% attendance will not be allowed to appear for the examination.
