- Explain with reference to the context, any three of the following passages, adding critical comments where necessary
  - (A) A body of men associated for purposes of robbery (as a Highland Clan in ancient times) shall be animated by perfect affection, and every member of it be ready to lay down his life for the life of his Chief. But a band of men associated for the purposes of legal production and accumulation is usually animated, it appears, by no such emotions and none of them are anywise willing to give his life for the life of his Chief
  - (B) So that, as above stated, the art of becoming 'rich', in the common sense, is not absolutely or finally the art of accumulating much money for ourselves, but also of contriving that our neighbours shall have less.
  - (C) Much store has been set for centuries upon the use of our English classical education. It were to be wished that our well educated merchants recalled to
    - mind always this much of their Latin Schooling, —that the nominative of valorem (a word already sufficiently familiar to them) is valor; a word which, therefore, ought to be familiar to them.
  - (D) Literature as we know it is an individual thing, demanding mental honesty and a minimum of censorship.
  - (E) The most hateful of all names in an English ear is Nosey Parker. It is obvious, of course, that even this purely private liberty is a lost cause. Like all other modern peoples, the English are in process of being numbered, labelled, conscripted, 'co-ordinated'.
  - (F) When you think of the coal-mine you think of depth, heat, darkness, blackened figures hacking at walls of coal; you don't think necessarily, of those miles of creeping to and fro.
